Care of the Dying Person (Adult): Symptom Management in the Last hours and Days of Life (LTHT)

This guidance provides medical and multi-disciplinary team guidance for planning and documenting compassionate care in the last days and hours of life. It has been written in line with the five priorities for care of the dying person, national guidance, which outlines the duties and responsibilities of all healthcare staff in the care of dying people.

1. Introduction
2. Hydration, Nutrition etc
3. Pain
4. Breathlessness
5. Agitation
6. Nausea and Vomiting
7. Retained Secretions
8. Seizures
9. Diabetes Mellitus
10. Management of anticipated imminently life-threatening haemorrhage or airway occlusion

- LPCN Renal Impairment: Prescribing at the end of life (including last days and hours of life): For LTHT use
- LPCN Liver Failure: Prescribing at the end of life (including last days and hours of life): For LTHT use
